Dear Bridgman Families and Residents,

Warm New Year greetings!

I trust you all had a delightful holiday season. As we reach the mid-point of the school year, I want to take a moment to celebrate the countless successes and triumphs that our dedicated staff and students have achieved, both inside and outside of the classroom.

I am thrilled to announce that Bridgman Public Schools has been recognized by US News and World Report for the Best Elementary and Middle Schools in 2024. Bridgman Elementary received the prestigious Best Elementary badge, while F.C. Reed claimed the Best Middle School badge. Both schools secured spots in the top 40% statewide. Bridgman Elementary achieved an exceptional #18 ranking among 2,654 elementary schools in Michigan, surpassing local counterparts by a significant margin. Meanwhile, F.C. Reed Middle School achieved an impressive #55 position out of 2,026 across the state. Bridgman High School maintains its streak of excellence, securing an outstanding #34 out of 1,166 ranking in Michigan, positioning it ahead of all local high schools. These rankings are a testament to the hard work and dedication of our students, teachers. and staff, bolstered by unwavering support from parents and the community.

Our district is committed to providing a top-notch education that equips students for future successes. We pride ourselves on cultivating academically proficient students, offering competitive athletic programs, and fostering a comprehensive performing, visual, and applied arts curriculum. Our students consistently excel in the State of Michigan assessments (M-Step and SAT), ranking among the top in the county.

I am proud to report that our recent annual audit of the District finances resulted in a clean opinion being issued by our auditors, Kruggel and Lawton. For the fiscal year ending June 30, 2023, the district added \$853,211 to its General Fund resulting in a balance of \$4,887,890 which represents a healthy 31.91% of annual expenditures.

and I want to extend my heartfelt gratitude to our esteemed school board members for their invaluable contributions to our community. Eric Ramso, JoAnn DeMeulenaere, Tishia Roberts, Brad Owen, Wayne Hall, Nancy Hawley, and Tom LaVanway devote countless personal hours to ensuring our community's needs are met through our public schools. We are indebted to these public servants whose dedication and civic duty enable local governance of our schools. Their foresight and advocacy are commendable, as they pave the way to equip today's students as the future leaders of tomorrow.

F.C. Reed Middle School News from Principal John Truesdell

Dear Community Members,

I'm proud to announce that the U.S. News recently named F.C. Reed Middle

School to their list of 2024 Best Middle Schools. This is a tremendous honor that is reserved for the top 40% of middle schools in the state of Michigan based on academic performance, school culture, and teacher efficacy. At closer look, the accomplishment is even more impressive. When the nationwide news organization analyzed 2,026 public, charter, magnet, and private middle schools throughout the state, RMS ranked #55. This puts F.C. Reed Middle School in the top 3% of middle schools statewide.

The accomplishment draws into question, "What makes RMS successful?"

First and foremost, it is our continued dedication to safety. During the 2023 - 2024 school year, students, parents/guardians, and faculty have embraced the creation of our new School Resource Officer and full time School Social Worker positions. The daily presence of Officer Wyman and Mrs. Cooper has enabled our team to curate a learning environment that is safe, secure, and supportive. We have also expanded partnerships with community organizations such as the Children's Advocacy Center (CAC) of Southwest Michigan. In coordination with our school counselor, the CAC will visit our building multiple times throughout the year to teach all students

about internet safety, digital citizenship, personal boundaries, and healthy habits. This proactive, preventative education is essential when working to ensure that our students can focus on academics when they arrive at school.

The mission of F.C. Reed Middle School aims to prepare each student socially, emotionally, and educationally for Bridgman High School and beyond. This high standard is critical to curating student achievement and only possible due to the collective efficacy of our staff. Universal free breakfast and lunch for all students, made possible by new state law, have empowered our food service team to feed all children twice a day so that they are nourished and ready to learn. RMS teachers have also invested endless hours to complete new professional development surrounding brain science and the neurological process of learning. This has enabled our staff to utilize new research based strategies that build connectedness with learners and increase student motivation. Our elite team of paraprofessionals have also been paramount to our success, going above and beyond to support special education students, implement systems of intervention, and substitute teach on short notice. These combined efforts have helped provide a culture of consistency and stability at school, enabling our student population to thrive.

Finally, it is critical to note that public education in Bridgman is a partnership. We are grateful for our community contributors and parents/guardians that expand our capacity to enrich the learning process.

Caitlyn was inspired by her high school choir teacher, Mrs. Woodland, because she was kind and encouraging and treated her students like they were her own kids.

Caitlyn keeps the passion for music alive in her students by providing them with exciting and new projects every year. She ensures that her students always have something to work on, whether it is a concert with different themes, songs they sing in class, or learning to play the Orff instruments, pianos, and recorders. Caitlyn believes that this approach keeps things fun and exciting, and she thrives on new projects and challenges. The students are her primary source of inspiration. As a specials teacher, she feels immense joy knowing

the entire building of students. Caitlyn loves to see how different personalities approach music concepts from different angles while working towards a common goal.

Over the last two years, Caitlyn has been invited by Jen Ammerman, the middle/high school choir teacher, to be a part of the musical team for *Once Upon A Mattress* and *Shrek*. This year, Caitlyn is already involved in the musical *Seussical Jr.* which will feature students from kindergarten through twelfth grade. Practices will begin in January, and the production will be held in March.

Caitlyn is also proud of her Recorder Karate unit with her third and fourth graders. When students work hard to earn a new belt for each song, they take so much pride in adding it to their recorder. Caitlyn is amazed when her students cheer their classmates on and share joy in the accomplishments of their friends.

Caitlyn recalls another gratifying moment from last year when she had a student who auditioned for, and received, a solo for the concert. During dress rehearsal, the student got very anxious and

fearful when he realized how many people he had to sing in front of alone. After a lot of encouragement from classmates and teachers, he faced his fear and did the solo in front of a packed theater that night. Almost a year later, he still talks about it, and Caitlyn couldn't be prouder!

Caitlyn is determined to help her students have a clear vision. and goal for their path in the Bridgman music program as they move on from the elementary building to middle school. She wants her students to feel confident and proud of their achievements by the time they leave her class and to remember that music class was a place where they felt welcome, loved and happy. She strives to create an atmosphere that encourages students to take risks, conquer challenges, and feel a sense of success and accomplishment when they've learned a particularly challenging song on the recorder or sang solo in front of the class. Caitlyn's ultimate wish is for her students to remember their class concerts as a positive experience and a fun memory.

Caitlyn is working towards establishing a youth choir program to provide students with more performance opportunities outside of school.



She has three messages that she wants her students to take away from their time in elementary school: to not be afraid to take risks and make mistakes, to always have an activity that brings joy and happiness, and that there is beauty and magic in being part of a musical ensemble. Caitlyn hopes that her students will continue to participate in choir or band all the way through to their senior year, as the memories they create over the years will be priceless.

The 2024 new year is upon us with this issue

of the Bridgman BUZZ! The Bridgman Foundation for Educational Excellence (BFEE) in July 2023, approved the project grant budget with an increase of over 15% setting it at \$17,500!

We're excited to collaborate with Bridgman Public Schools' (BPS) administration, faculty and students on project initiatives that will make an educational difference for students and our community.

RMS Courtyard Renovation Project

As we read in the Fall 2023 BUZZ publication, F.C. Reed Middle School (RMS) Principal John Truesdell identified a "transformational" renovation that has become a reality. The RMS courtyard renovation project will pave the way for a new outdoor classroom and garden with over 1,600 square feet of area. The BFEE is proud to be involved and has committed to raise \$10,000 through a project grant request to complete phase 1 of the RMS courtyard

renovation. Phase 1 will focus on furnishing the space with basic furniture and shade devices. Specifically, six hexagonal picnic tables with a seating capacity of 35 and accompanying umbrella shade units. Additionally, it provides the RMS garden club with the financial resources necessary to plant a full garden around the perimeter of the space. The goal of the RMS courtyard renovation project as described in the grant request is to create an outdoor classroom and meeting space that can be used by teachers, student organizations, and community partners. The RMS courtyard renovation directly supports the BFEE mission, "to provide enrichment opportunities to the students and staff of Bridgman Public Schools for the betterment of the community." The BFEE trustees, thank RMS for this opportunity to serve!

BFEE, What's Next?

We'll work hard to collaborate and review for approval BPS District grant requests, coordinate BFEE community events, and provide District input to name the next BIG PROJECT so our community can rally together! Like the educational RMS STEM lab, which is a BPS success story countywide, the community will again make an impact through the next BIG PROJECT!



We begin the New Year by sharing thrilling news – in October 2023, the City of Bridgman was honored with

the prestigious Community Excellence Award, a recognition bestowed by the Michigan Municipal League, a statewide association of cities and villages. Representatives from around the state voted to award the Bridgman Courtyard as their favorite project among the four finalists (including entries from the City of Westland, the City of Port Huron and the City of Coldwater). As the smallest community by population competing against projects that cost multiple millions of dollars, Bridgman should be proud that its spirit of collaboration was recognized by its peers. As our efforts to develop a special gathering place in downtown Bridgman were themselves inspired by previous award winners, we hope our Courtyard serves as inspiration for other communities from around the state (and indeed, for more peoplefriendly projects within Bridgman itself).

In early November 2023, the City placed a full-page ad in the Harbor Country News, thanking those individuals, businesses and organizations that brought the Courtyard to life through their contributions of time, talent and resources. Here's a much smaller version of the ad to say thank you to those involved, and to remind all of us that a

community's greatest strength is its people. Each of us possesses unique abilities and gifts, and when we come together to share them collectively we can make meaningful and lasting change. Will you lend your hand in developing Bridgman's next special placemaking project?

Trash and Recycling

As we kick off 2024 I would like to make our residents and businesses aware of plans to seek bids for the city's trash and recycling collection service. The City has contracted Republic Services for solid waste collection since 2001 and has been pleased with the company's customer service and cost structure. (Bridgman has among the lowest rates for trash and recycling collection service within Berrien County.)

Our original contract has expired and the service, which currently costs around \$175,000 per year, must be competitively bid in keeping with the Bridgman City Charter.

In July 2023 the City Council adopted a resolution to initiate the implementation of a City-wide special assessment district to pay for the cost of providing trash and recycling collection services. This cost would be added to the tax bills of residents who receive trash and recycling collection services in the summer

of 2024. Please visit the City's website for more information about the special assessment process.

Roads

Bridgman has a number of local roads that are in poor condition, as rated using the Pavement Surface Evaluation and Rating System (PASER). PASER relies on trained staff to visually assess pavement conditions while driving, assigning a value of 1 through 10 based on observed defects. For example, Baldwin Road received an assessment rating of 'poor – 1 to 4' in 2019.

As Bridgman's major and local street budgets are very constrained, the City has largely relied on grant funding to repave its streets. While we have been partially successful (2014 – Red Arrow Highway \$909,000; 2023 – Lake Street between Church Street and Gast Road \$512,000) grant and earmark requests have also been rejected (most recently, a \$900,000 request for Baldwin Road and a \$310,000 request to cover 50% of the cost of reconstructing all roads in the Stelter Farm and Water Tower subdivisions.

Our administration understands that good roads are important to residents and businesses, so the City will continue to aggressively pursue road funding through federal and state sources, while also seeking other means of financing improvements. Among the means discussed at the City Council level is using the monies collected by the trash and recycling special assessment to undertake road repair and reconstruction.

Understanding Early Voting in the State of Michigan

from the City Clerk, Sheila Reitz

Hello Bridgman residents!

The 2024 Election Cycle is shaping up to be one of the busiest for the State of Michigan. For the first time in the history of elections in Michigan, registered and qualified voters will have increased opportunities to cast their vote during an early voting period before Election Day making participation in the democratic process more convenient than ever.

Michigan now offers two methods to cast your vote before Election Day:

- 1. Absentee Voting This option is available to all registered and qualified voters in the state. You can request an absentee ballot for the current and/or all future elections, by joining the Permanent Ballot List, and then vote from the comfort of your home.
- **2. In-Person Early Voting** If you prefer the experience of voting in person, you can head to designated early voting locations in Berrien County. This option allows you to cast your ballot in advance of Election Day.

How to Participate in Early Voting

As is the case with all elections, there are several costs to the local municipalities to implement early voting for their residents. To be fiscally responsible, the City of Bridgman has partnered with several municipalities and Berrien County to provide early voting to all registered and qualified voters.

The required early voting period before all statewide and federal elections will begin on the second Saturday before the election and end on the Sunday prior to Election Day. Early voting must be offered for nine (9) consecutive days and at least eight (8) hours a day during this time frame.

Registered and qualified voters of the City of Bridgman may cast their vote in person during the early voting period at the south county site.

Assessing Department Updates

from the Assessor, John Baumann

The Assessing Department of the City of Bridgman is responsible for ensuring that all properties in the city are assessed accurately and fairly.

Personal property statements will be mailed out to residents and business owners by January 10, 2024 and are due to the assessor's office by February 20, 2024. Many small businesses were eligible for an exemption of personal property taxes for 2023 but did not file the Small Business Taxpayer Exemption paperwork. We highly encourage small businesses to file and to make the process easier we will include the paperwork in the mailing.

It is important to note that in 2023 the Michigan legislature increased the Small Business Taxpayer Exemption to \$180,000 in true cash value, which means most businesses in Bridgman are eligible for the exemption if they file the appropriate paperwork. However, business owners who qualified and filed for the Small Business Taxpayer Exemption in 2019 or after need not file the form again in 2024.

It is very important that those business owners who did NOT file the small business taxpayer exemption in 2019 or after and qualify for the exemption, file it in 2024 to be exempted from 2024 personal property taxes.

Tax Day – December 31 is designated as Tax Day in the State of Michigan

Your property's assessment is based on how it stands on that day. For example, your 2023 assessment and tax bills were calculated based on how your property appeared on December 31, 2022. Currently we are working on the 2024 assessments and will base those assessments on the condition of your property as of December 31, 2023.

2024 Assessment Notices

By the end of February 2024, Property Tax Assessment Notices will be mailed to each taxpayer for real and personal property. These notices show the change in assessed and taxable values for your property from 2023 to 2024. The notice also shows your homestead percentage and if there was a transfer of ownership that resulted in an uncapping of your taxable value. It is crucial to review this notice when you receive it to verify that all information is correct. If you find any errors or have any questions on the assessed or taxable value change, please call the assessing office at 269-465-5144 x104 or email jbaumann@bridgman.org.

The Assessing Department has property record cards on file for every parcel in the city and you are always welcome and encouraged to come in and review your property record card(s). You can also find assessing information online via the City of Bridgman website at BSA Online.

Building & Zoning News from Building Administrator, Rich Kubsch

Happy New Year! The Planning Commission and I have been working together for almost three years now, and I must say they are a great team to work with. It seems like it has been a quiet year, but in reality we have been working on several projects including the Master Plan, ordinance amendments, ordinance review, and Planning Commission bylaws. These projects are not easy or exciting to work on, but they are essential to being prepared for new projects, developers, and the overall community needs.

In 2024, the Planning Commission will finally finish the Master Plan. It has taken a fair amount of time to prepare, but the Planning Commission did the work and spent time reviewing every part of the document. This will ensure that projects coming in or changes to how the community develops will be proactive and not reactive. Along with the Master Plan, there will be a full review of the Township Zoning Ordinance. The Ordinance was reworked in 2011, but many of the objectives of the 2007 Master Plan were left out, meaning the Ordinance does not always cover things as it should. We are hoping these changes will go smoothly and that the Ordinance will reflect where the community is today.

There is a new housing development being reviewed early in 2024. The proposed location is off California Road, across from the Middle School. We are hopeful that this project will be successful, and Lake Township will be seeing 35 new homes located in a great location. Also, on the note of new homes, Warren Dunes Village will be starting their expansion this year. It will be towards Hildebrandt Road and will give them 54 new homes added to their complex.

The Planning Commission has been given the task to look into a possible rental ordinance. The Ordinance would cover all rentals and will probably be a safety-related ordinance. It is too early to say what this ordinance will look like or if it will be adopted by the Township Board after their review.



Water System News from Jeff Burkhard

Hello, Everyone.

I hope you all had a wonderful holiday season. Another year has flown by, and it's time to reflect on our achievements in 2023 and our plans for 2024. One of the main highlights of 2023 was the successful water main replacement project on Rambo Rd. and Snow Rd. This five-month project will finally conclude in the spring of 2024 with the remaining clean-up and restoration work. We understand that some of you may have been impacted by scheduled water shutdowns during this project, and we appreciate your patience and understanding. The replacement of this water main will significantly improve reliability and address several problem areas. If you face any issues with this project, please do not hesitate to let us know.

In 2024, we will replace a few valves in the system to replace aging infrastructure, given that our water distribution system will be 50 years old. We will continue upgrading our system to improve reliability and ensure that we provide you with the best water services.

In June/July 2024, we will conduct our triennial Lead and Copper Sampling, which is mandatory under the Michigan EGLE Lead and Copper Rule. We have had this sampling program in place for many years, and if you participated in the sampling three years ago, you will be contacted again in 2024. Please note that sites are chosen based on strict criteria to meet


regulations, and locations are not randomly selected. Your past participation is greatly appreciated and has contributed to the success of the program.

Additionally, we will finish the service line inventory verification in 2024, which is also a mandatory regulation to comply with the Lead and Copper rule revisions. We must verify the service line to your residence for unknown service lines, confirming that our system has no known lead service lines. If you were one of the residences affected by this verification, you would have received a notification. If you did receive one and did not respond, we will contact you to fulfill this regulation. (We know from records and practices that no lead service lines exist, but it still has to be verified.)

In January 2024, we will participate in a required EPA study for two emerging contaminants, per and polyfluoroalkyl substances (PFAS) and lithium, for future regulations. We have also participated in past studies for PFAS and cyanotoxins from algal blooms.

Finally, let us remember how essential clean and safe water is and what a remarkable resource it is. We cannot survive without it, and our families and communities cannot thrive without it. We monitor water quality continuously. If you are ever interested in a tour of our facility, please contact me and we can make arrangements.


